In this special 50-year edition journal, you will learn about the beginnings of the SBHA, what's going on in the present, and what happened to get us here as well as where we, as your board, envision the SBHA heading into the future.

The Founders had a vision of preservation and restoration and made great strides towards that goal. Later the Wilbur- Cruce strain was accepted into the association and those new members and breeders have continued working toward the mission of the SBHA.

The last several years have seen a number of the big land preservation breeders retiring and having to disburse their herds. We changed our name from the Spanish Barb Breeders Association to the Spanish Barb Horse Association. We are now a 501c3 Non-Profit which makes us eligible for grants and other financial benefits. We are ramping up our promotional efforts; with a fabulous website, social media presence and numerous write ups in different magazines. We are being sought after to bring the horses and their history to a variety of public events and your board is actively pursuing other avenues to preserve our horses.

So, what does the future look like? How do we perpetuate the breed now that there are no more preservation herds? Luckily several members are interested in helping in that area. Now we head towards “suburban breeding”; breeding a few foals a year on limited acreage. This will entail intense cooperation and an emphasis, as always, on registration and communication!

We are working on helping owners keep stallions and keep them available to mare owners: getting everyone more knowledgeable on AI, both cooled and frozen semen, educating and putting a plan in place for post-mortem tissue collection especially in emergency situations, putting some type of plan into place to help owners as they age/retire or have emergency situations as to what happens to their horses. We cannot afford to lose any valuable genetics. We also want to mentor our new members/breeders so they can be successful in saving these unique horses into the future.

It will take ALL of us being stewards of the horses, and not leaving it to just the breeders to be successful in bringing the Spanish Barb into the future so that this living history will be here for many generations to come. The time has come for us all to work to educate the public and recruit new members to help to save something that is bigger and more important than we are. Let's move energetically forward into the next 50 years!

Only together can we be a voice in the present for the future of the horses from the past.
